began, all customers were required to possess a medical patient or caregiver card. With the elimination of that requirement because of recreational sales to anyone 21 or older, medical patient and caregiver registrants have declined. There were about 17,000 fewer patients and 6,000 fewer caregivers in July as there were in December 2019. Those are decreases of about 6.4% and 17%, respectively.

Meanwhile, the market has become increasingly competitive — and saturated — with new retailers.

As of September, 360 businesses had been licensed to sell recreational mariiuana in the state. That's more than existed in September 2020.

The amount of marijuana flower has also boomed. In March 2020, there was a total of 3,690 pounds of marijuana sold - 1,316 recreational and 2,374 medical. In July, the total number of marijuana flower sold equaled 24,389 pounds -18,235 pounds, or 75%, of which was recreational sales.

The competition, growth and reduction in medical customers has affected flower prices to the benefit of consumers. In January 2020, recreational customers were paying \$516.21 per ounce on average and medical customers \$267.30

As of July, recreational marijuana cost an average \$217.94 per ounce, and medical \$213.39 per ounce. Since January 2020, recreational flower prices dropped double the 162 licensed businesses that nearly 58% and medical prices 20%.

littered and getting into Earth's surface waters and ultimately into the ocean," Enck said.

The report shows emissions from plastics manufacturing already are on an upswing. Industry officials reported a 10 million-ton increase in greenhouse gas emissions last year, and construction is underway on a dozen new plastics factories with at least that many more planned.

Environmental Council, said environmental advocates have tried to raise awareness that plastics are the future of the fossil fuel industry — complete with greenhouse gas emissions.

"We're not getting rid of plastic. It's a ubiquitous piece of our culture. And it's something that we will never likely move completely away from," he said.

Jason Geer, president and chief executive officer of the Michigan Oil and Gas Association, recently confirmed plastics will be the core of future natural gas markets. He said the industry predicts an increase in the use of that fossil fuel through 2050.

"It just may be used differently," he said. "You can't make plastics without natural gas."

That's why environmentalists are focused on industrial-level users over individual consumers.

Hammond argued three ways to minimize the expanding plastics trend include recycling better, producing less plastic, and what are called "extended producer responsibility requirements," such as per-piece manufacturer fees and improved take-back obligations.

He said individual consumers can always reduce how much plastic they bring into their lives, adopt reusable products and reduce their carbon footprint. But he said it's more important to hold accountable the big players manufacturers.

"There's a lot of coverage lately on what's called nurdles, which are the little pellets that go into making the bigger plastic pieces," Hammond said. "Those have been found on all the Great Lakes beaches that they've tested in the last few years, and those never see consumers; those are only business-to-business industrial processing pieces, so there's no consumer in that booth at all.

"But we're still seeing this pollution widespread throughout the Great Lakes region and, likely, if you were to test more, you'd find it in a lot of waterways.

Beyond Plastics project researcher Jim Vallette said the growing plastics manufacturing industry has environmental injustice implications beyond greenhouse gas emissions and widespread plastics pollution.

"Many people look at petrochemical plants in isolation from each other, but there are many interdependencies between them," he said. "Understanding these relationships is essential to assessing the public health and other tools this industry imposes upon communities of color and low-income communities.

"In addition to the climate pollution, these facilities release massive amounts of toxic pollutants, including plastic powders, pellets into the air and water. This pollution causes extreme cumulative impacts in some of this country's most vulnerable communities."

About 90% of the nation's plastics production happens in just 18 communities - primarily along the Gulf Coast where the new report shows residents earn 28% less than the average U.S. household and are 67% more likely to be people of color.

Overview: Amendments will be made to the biennial and triennial license Overview: Amendments will be made to the biennial and triennial license and registration renewal rules, and the date of renewal for occupational therapy, physical therapy, respiratory therapy, counseling, and social work will be changed to the date of the year when the licensee's initial license or the registrant's initial registration was issued. Amendments will be made to the rule providing the minimum English language standard to clarify that the International English Language Testing System Academic test and the Test of English as foreign Language Internet-Based Test must be taken within 2 years of the date of application for licensure or registration because test scores cannot be verified after 2 years. The rule pertaining to the Stark Law will be updated, and the rule pertaining to implicit bias training will be revised to clarify that it applies to all applicants, including those for relicensure or reregistration.

The rules will take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State, unless specified otherwise in the rules. Comments on the proposed rules may be presented in person at the public hearing. ## Driver dies after crash, car fire

# WHO Europe chief voices 'grave concern' about COVID rebound

GENEVA (AP) - A 53-country region in Europe and Central Asia faces the "real threat" of a resurgence of the coronavirus pandemic in the coming weeks or already is experiencing a new wave of infections, the head of the World Health Organization's regional office said Thursday.

Dr. Hans Kluge said case counts are beginning to near record levels again and the pace of transmission in the region, which stretches as far east as the former Soviet republics in Central Asia, is of "grave concern."

"We are at another critical point of pandemic resurgence," Kluge told reporters from the WHO Euheadquarters in Copenhagen, Denmark. "Europe is back at the epicenter of the pandemic, where we were one year

He said the difference now is that health authorities know more about the virus and have better tools to combat it. Relaxed prevention measures and low vaccination rates in some areas explain the latest

surge, he said. Kluge said hospitalization rates due to COVID-19 in the 53-country region more than doubled over the last week. If that trajectory continues, the region could see another 500,000 pandemic deaths by February, he said.

WHO Europe says the region tallied nearly 1.8 million new weekly cases, an increase of about 6% from the previous week, and 24,000 COVID-19 weekly deaths - a 12% gain.

Kluge said the countries in the region were at "varying stages of vaccination rollout" and that regionwide an average of 47% of people were fully vaccinated. Only eight countries had 70% of their populations fully vaccinated.

"We must change our tactics, from reacting to surges of COVID-19, to preventing them from happening in the first place,

Kluge said. WHO's headquarters in Geneva on Wednesday reported that cases had risen in Europe for the fifth consecutive week, making it the only world region where COVID-19 is still increasing. The infection rate was by far the highest in Europe, which reported some 192 new cases per

100,000 people. Sweden's chief epidemi-ologist, Anders Tegnell, said Thursday that "we are clearly in another wave," and added that "the increased spread is entirely

concentrated in Europe." Several countries in Central and Eastern Europe have seen daily case numbers shoot up in recent

weeks. At an online briefing Thursday by the Amsterdam-based European Medicines Agency, experts urged people to get vacci-

"The epidemiological situation in Europe is very concerning now as we head into the winter with increases in infection rates, hospitalization and we can also see the increase in fasaid Fergus talities," Sweeney, the EMA's head of clinical studies and

# Unemployment claims drop to 269,000, another pandemic low

WASHINGTON - The number of Americans applying for unemployment benefits fell to a fresh pandemic low last week, another sign the job market is healing after last year's coronavirus recession.

Jobless claims dropped by 14,000 to 269,000 last week. Since topping 900,000 in early January, the weekly applications have fallen more or less steadily ever since and are gradually moving toward pre-pandemic levels of around 220,000 a week.

Overall, 2.1 million Americans were collecting unemployment checks the week of Oct. 23 – down from 7.1 million a year earlier when the economy was still reeling from the coronavirus outbreak.

The four-week average of claims, which smooths out weekly ups and downs, dropped below 285,000, also a pandemic low.

The job market has been rebounding since the pandemic struck the U.S. economy in the spring of 2020. In March and April of that year, employers slashed more 22 million jobs as governments ordered lockdowns and consumers and workers stayed home as a health precau-

The economy has recovered 17 million of the jobs lost to the pandemic and later today, the U.S. will release its closely watched monthly report on jobless claims. Economists believe employers added 400,000 jobs in October, more than twice the jobs added in September. But the United States is still 5 million jobs short of where it stood in

February 2020. "Claims are headed in the right direction, showing the labor market recovery continues, albeit slowly," wrote economists with Contingent Macro Research on Thursday. "Moreover, some statelevel volatility appears to be easing, and seasonal adjustments were minor and should remain so for the next few weeks.

Government checks and the rollout of vaccines have given consumers the confidence and financial wherewithal to resume spending - so much so that companies have scrambled to keep up with surging demand. They complain they can't find workers to fill their job openings – a near record 10.4 million in August - and are being forced to raise wages, offer signing bonuses and improve benefits and working conditions.

# **US** mandates vaccines or tests for big companies by Jan. 4

Tens of millions of Americans who work at companies with 100 or more employees will need to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 by Jan. 4 or get tested for the virus weekly under government

rules issued Thursday. The new requirements, which were first previewed by President Joe Biden in September, will apply to about 84 million workers at medium and large businesses, although it is not clear how many of those employees are

unvaccinated. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration regulations will force the companies to require that unvaccinated workers test negative for COVID-19 at least once a week and wear a mask

while in the workplace. OSHA left open the possibility of expanding the requirement to smaller businesses. It asked for public comment on whether employers with fewer than 100 employees could handle vaccination or testing programs.

Tougher rules will apply to another 17 million people who work in nursing homes, hospitals and other facilities that receive money from Medicare and Medicaid. Those workers will not have an option for testing they will need to be vaccinated.

Workers will be able to ask for exemptions on medical or religious grounds.

OSHA said companies that fail to comply with the regulations could face penalties of

nearly \$14,000 per violation. It was unclear how OSHA planned to enforce the rules: Even counting allied regulators at the state level, the agency has only 1,850 inspectors to oversee 130 million workers at 8 million workplaces. A senior administration official said OSHA will target companies if it gets complaints.

The release of the rules fol-

lowed weeks of regulatory review and meetings with business groups, labor unions and others. The regulations form the cornerstone of Biden's most aggressive effort yet to combat the spread of COVID-19, which has killed more than 740,000 people in

OSHA drafted the rules under emergency authority meant to protect workers from an imminent health hazard. The agency estimated that the vaccine mandate will save more than 6,500 worker lives and prevent more than 250,000 hospitalizations over the next six months.

Senior administration officials said the rules preempt conflicting state laws or orders, including those that ban employers from requiring vaccinations, testing or the wearing of face masks.

The administration will face an immediate challenge from Republican state officials who are eager to fight Biden in court and in Congress. Senate Republicans immediately launched a petition to force a vote to overturn the vaccine mandate, but with Democrats controlling the chamber, the effort is nearly certain to fail.

More than two dozen Republicans serving as state attorneys general have indicated they plan to sue, arguing that only Congress can enact such sweeping requirements under emergency authority.

Last week, 19 states sued to stop Biden's narrower mandate that employees of federal contractors be vaccinated. That requirement was scheduled to take effect Dec. 8, but the administration said Thursday it will be delayed until Jan. 4 to match the requirements on other large employers and health care providers.

The rules will require workers to receive either two doses of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines or one dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine by Jan. 4 or be tested weekly. Employees who test positive must be removed from the workplace.

The requirements will not apply to people who work at home or outdoors.

Companies won't be required to provide or pay for the tests, but they must give paid time off for employees to get vaccines and sick leave to recover from side effects that prevent them from working. The requirements for masks and paid time off for shots will take effect Dec. 5.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services issued a separate rule requiring vaccination for workers in 76,000 health facilities and home health care providers that get funding from the government health programs. A senior administration official said that several large private health care organizations imposed their own mandates and achieved high vaccination rates - 96% or higher without widespread resigna-

The White House sees the new requirements as a potent tool to winnow down the ranks of the tens of millions of Americans who have thus far refused to get a shot.

For weeks, Biden has encouraged businesses not to wait for the OSHA rule to take effect. He has touted businesses that have already announced their own vaccine mandates and urged other companies to follow their lead.

Administration officials say those efforts are paying off, with about 70% of the nation's adults now fully vaccinated.

Walmart, the nation's largest private employer, said in late July it was requiring all workers at its headquarters in Bentonville, Arkansas, as well as its managers who travel within the U.S., to be vaccinated against COVID-19 by Oct. 4. But the company had stopped short of requiring shots for its frontline workers.

# Michigan drivers will get insurance refunds; details coming

LANSING - All insured Michigan drivers will be getting refunds due to a \$5 billion surplus in a fund that reimburses insurers medical and other costs for people seriously injured in crashes.

The Michigan Catastrophic Fund Association's board said Wednesday that it voted unanimously to support issuing checks. The move came days after Gov. Gretchen Whitmer called for refunds, citing excessive premiums along with savings under a 2019 law that curbed medical expenses and made mandatory unlimited health coverage option-

"Details on the specific refund amount per vehicle, along with a proposed timeline and logistics, will be announced in the next several weeks," the board, comprised almost entirely of insurance companies, said in a statement. "The goal is to issue the largest possible refunds to consumers while maintaining sufficient funds to ensure high-quality care to those who have been catastrophically injured."

Under the 2019 law, the state insurance director must hire an independent actuary starting next July and every third year after to audit the MCCA, a state-created nonprofit that reimburses car insurers for personal injury protection medical claims surpassing \$600,000. If the review - due by September - shows the MCCA's assets exceed 120% of its liabilities, the difference must

be refunded. Under the Democratic governor's proposal, the entire \$5 billion surplus would be returned - \$675 per car. MCCA Executive Director Kevin Clinton said this week that having no surplus would be too risky, saying the law could require an estimated \$100 per-vehicle refund.

Whitmer called the pending refunds "great news."

Many motorists currently are paying \$86 a vehicle annually to the MCCA. The fee was \$220 in 2019-20 but has been dropping due to

"It's important for the MCCA board to do its due diligence and land on a refund amount that balances giving insured drivers back the money they deserve while protecting the longevity of a fund that pays for the cost of medical care for Michiganders seriously injured in car accidents," said Insurance Alliance of Michigan Executive Director Erin McDonough.

Critics of the law said people absolutely are owed a refund because insurance companies have been "gouging" them for years. But they also renewed a push for stalled legislation to help catastrophically injured motorists who they said are losing care because of slashed reimbursements to rehabilitation facilities and other providers.

Michigan Brain Injury Provider Council President Tom Judd urged Whitmer to show "bold leadership." Republican legislative leaders have not embraced the policv bills. In July, the governor and Legislature did approve \$25 million in aid for providers that can show financial losses, though some lawmakers have said it is inadequate.

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
