Houghton OKs settlement with Walmart over suit

Council approves deal this week

Houghton's battle with Walmart over taxes is nearing an end.

The Houghton City Wednesday Council approved a settlement agreement with Walmart regarding the city's civil suit in U.S. District Court.

The settlement lays out the terms of a new service agreement with Walmart that will replace the development agreement it made with the city upon expanding to a Supercenter in 2004.

"Based on discussions with our attorneys and assessor and working together with them on this for more than a year, it's my recommendation the council approve this service agreement to settle the matter," City Manager Eric Waara said.

2018, Walmart sought to lower its tax valuation through the Michigan Tax Tribunal, making the "dark store" argument that its value should be based on that of the empty building, based on the likely difficulty of finding another buyer if the store closed.

The case was put on hold after the Father's Day Flood, but picked up again this year. The two sides eventually reached an agreement in June prior to a scheduled hearing.

Earlier this year, the city also sued Walmart in federal court alleging it had violated the terms of the 2004 development agreement.

In that agreement, the city agreed to transfer property, conduct capital and public service improvements, and also provide environmental services, such as environmental monitoring in perpetuity. In exchange, Walmart agreed to a property tax increase of at least \$1.95 million, which brought it to more than \$4.5 million in 2005.

The amount Walmart

sought was below that amount. The settlement on the Tax Tribunal case reached in June retroactively adjusted the 2018 taxable value to \$2,354,975 – slightly more than half what it had

Under the new service agreement, Houghton will continue to provide environmental monitoring service, as required under the Department of Environmental Quality permit for construction around the Huron Creek wetlands. The city also agreed to continue providing municipal bus service to and from Walmart.

The new agreement also includes an annual \$40,000 service fee Walmart will pay to Houghton for the services it provides. That fee will also be applied retroactively to each year since 2018, when Walmart began trying to lower its property taxes.

The fee is not a property tax, but will go back to the city's Tax Increment Finance Authority district on advice of the city's attorney, Waara said.

Future property tax agreements with Walmart are also regulated by the agreement. It will not contest true cash, assessed or taxable values in a year where its taxable value does not increase by more than 4%.

If it does, Walmart can take a dollar-for-dollar credit against the annual service fee for every dollar above 4%, or file an appeal with the Tax Tribunal.

The agreement also lays out procedures for the two sides to resolve disputes about the taxable value, including a meeting between the two sides and

arbitration. Similar procedure will be in place if Walmart's tax liability exceeds 4%.

After the council's approval Wednesday, the city's attorneys will file to dismiss the court case.

Report notes Lakeshore Drive deck condition before demolition

thinned-out, pockmarked H-pile beam would look unexceptional in a junkyard. At its spot near the Houghton City Council dais Wednesday night, it looked out of place.

In the spot it had been for the previous 45 years, helping keep up the Lakeshore Drive parking deck, it was many similar pieces being corroded by the elements and nearing the end of their useful life — and by extension, the deck's.

U.P. Engineers & Architects compiled a report with observations and findings from demolition of the deck. It is available on the city's website.

UPEA's nine-page report found the condition of the deck observed during its demolition supported the council's decision to tear it

"While one cannot speculate if a catastrophic failure was imminent, the past documented safety hazards and structural deterioration

witnessed during demolition provided clear evidence that failure was eventual without extensive rehabilitation of the deck structure," the report said.

The deck was on "borrowed time," Houghton City Manager Eric Waara said Wednesday. According to the report, decks in comparable northern climates typically have a service life of 40 to 50 years. But the deck's expected service life had been considerably shorter.

The main culprit: deicing chemicals, particularly salt. Testing in 1999 found chloride had gotten up to 3 inches inside the decks, which in most places were only 5 inches thick.

Though the city stopped using salt, the existing chloride continued penetrating the deck over the next 24 years, the report said.

The salts and moisture from the freeze-thaw cycle went through the concrete to the steel undergirding it.

tensioning strands, which

About 50% of the post

keep the concrete together, had lost all or most of their tension by the time the deck came down, the report said.

Many subsurface columns and steel connection plates had also corroded, the report said. Those include the H-pile unearthed during the demolition.

Crews had to stabilize the deck before tearing it down. To stop the frame from swaying, they welded large beams in place to brace the frame. Other parts of the deck

also saw damage. At the parapet walls, water infiltration had made it possible to remove the bricks by band. In the wait tower, parts of the stair pan were so corroded they fell off.

Waara had asked one of the project supervisors when it would have been easier to take the deck down, he said Wednesday. The answer: "Ten years

"It was time, and I guess this is a bit of validation for all the discussion and the debate that took place at the Planning Commission, the subcommittee, in this chamber about why we needed to take it down," Waara said. "I know a lot of people didn't want to take it down. I didn't want to have to take it down. But I also didn't want us to end up on the front page of every newspaper in the Midwest because 'Small Michigan town suffers (insert disaster here)'. And that's the reason why right there.'

Vivid fall colors draw many to region

ESCANABA – In addition to being surrounded by three Great Lakes, the Upper Peninsula is graced with thick forests of various species of trees, whose seasonal changes make for displays that draw visitors in search of beautiful autumn color tours.

While particular locations like Tahquamenon Falls, Lake of the Clouds, Fayette, Pictured Rocks, and the other usual suspects - of course become destinations for many, some of the most appreciated landscapes are viewed through windshields as drivers and passengers gape at the foliage along county roads.

"With (Lakes) Superior, Michigan, and Huron that causes majestic overlooks in contrast to rocks and water and all sorts of things. But they really also like to cruise in and out of, you know, roads and even some of the highways," said Tom Nemacheck, executive director of the Upper Peninsula Travel and Recreation Association. "A lot of it is centered around the vistas around the Great Lakes. ... The other way to look at the

inland road situation is the vistas around waterfalls and inland lakes ... It's, again, more up close and personal than some of the, you know, vast distances.'

Federal Forest Highway 13, U.S. 141, and Upper Pine Creek Road were among favorite routes cited by residents of the central and western U.P. Black River National Scenic Byway, which takes travelers past a handful of the U.P.'s 300 waterfalls, is also said to

boast gorgeous scenes. As visitors and residents "venture out into every nook and cranny, looking for that particular look," (Nemacheck's words), the entire U.P. experiences a boom that

may be seen as another peak of the tourist season that is no longer limited to summer.

"Usually a little bit of a lull around Labor Day, and then it seems to pick back up again," reported John Gaudette, who, along with his wife Beverly ("Bev"), owned the Woodlands Motel in Iron Mountain for a few months shy of 40 years.

"Towards the last few - I would say even the last five to 10.... years, we always experienced a little spike, and it was the fall color tour season," said Bev.
