required by the Administrative Procedures Act to allow
the public to comment on the proposed changes to this
rule set. As with all other public hearings on draft
rule sets, the only items discussed during this hearing
will be the proposed changes to the rule set. This
hearing will not be covering any questions or discussions
on any other issues.

We are calling this hearing to order at 1:00 p.m. on March 9, 2021, via Zoom to comply with statutorily required measures designed to help prevent the spread of Coronavirus 2019, known as COVID-19. The notice of public hearing was published in three newspapers of general circulation, the Grand Rapids Press, the Flint Journal, and the Mining Journal on Penn Reporting, LLC - lori.penn@yahoo.com

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February 12, 2021, as well as the *Michigan Register*, Issue No. 2-2021, published on February 15, 2021.

All comments should relate directly to the proposed rules. If you have questions about the rules, you may place your comments on the record and the Department will review and can consider them. If you have suggested changes to the proposed rules, please indicate the specific reasons why the changes would be in the public interest.

We will take comments in the following manner.

- For those using the Video Conference Portion,

 not calling in on a telephone, please use the

 "Raise Your Hand" feature in Zoom. I will call

 on individuals to speak and they will be unmuted

 at that time.
- For participants that are available only by telephone, we will ask if you wish to make a comment after the video participants have finished.
- please note the Department will also accept written statements e-mailed or postmarked to BPL-BoardSupport@Michigan.gov until 5:00 p.m. today.

If you have previously submitted comments in writing to the Bureau, it is not necessary for you to repeat your comments on the record today. Comments made in writing will be reviewed and considered by the Department in the same manner as comments made during this public hearing.

Those making comments during this hearing should clearly and slowly say and spell your name and advise if you are speaking on behalf of an organization. We will limit comments to three minutes per person. Please remember that only one person should speak at a time.

The Department staff from the Bureau of Professional Licensing here today includes me, Kerry Przybylo, and Stephanie Wysack.

Is there anyone who wishes to make comment about the Public Health Code - General Rules at this time?

MS. PRZYBYLO: Again, if you wish to -this is Kerry Przybylo. If you wish to speak, please use
the "Raise Your Hand" feature in the reactions button at
the bottom of your screen.

I'm not seeing anybody raising their hands, so we'll go to those that are on the telephone.

telephone, please hit *6 to unmute yourself so that we 1 2 may hear your comment. I see that a few of us -- a few attendees 3 4 just connected to audio. If you just connected to audio 5 and you wish to speak and make a comment about the rules, please press *6 on your telephone to unmute yourself, if 6 7 you're calling in on your phone as well. If you're calling in on -- if you're attending by video, please use 8 9 the reaction button at the bottom to "Raise Your Hand". 10 Okay. We have some comments. So 11 first -- oh, boy. Okay. The first person that I see 12 is -- they lowered their hands. Their hands were raised 13 but then they, then they lowered their hands. 14 MS. MARKS: It looks like maybe Victoria 15 has a comment. 16 VICTORIA DINKIN: Hi. I have a general 17 question. I apologize, I just --18 MS. MARKS: I'm sorry, Victoria, could 19 you please state and spell your first and last name? 20 VICTORIA DINKIN: Sure. Victoria Dinkin, 21 D-i-n-k-i-n, Victoria is V-i-c-t-o-r-i-a. 22 MS. MARKS: Thank you. Go ahead with 23 your comments. 24 VICTORIA DINKIN: Okay. I just recently 25 learned about this in the past couple of days, so I'm Penn Reporting, LLC - lori.penn@yahoo.com

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sorry, I apparently missed out on something. My understanding is that this is for a hearing to consider two changes; one is to change the date of license renewal and one is to add another requirement for licensure or renewal. My concern or question really deals with the licensure date change. Is there consideration given for -- in other words, right now in my profession we renew towards the end of the year. If that is to be changed, let's say my date of initial license application and effectiveness was in July, is that going to become effective as of this year or will it be effective next year; is it going to be a prorated amount? And what was the logic behind changing that date? I read what was written here, but it still doesn't seem like that makes an effective difference to me, so I was just concerned about that. Thank you.

MS. PRZYBYLO: All right. Is there anybody else who wishes to make a comment about the rules? Please "Raise Your Hand" with the reaction button, or to unmute yourself, please hit *6.

Looks like Mark McWilliams has a comment. Go ahead, Mark. You need to unmute yourself first, please.

MARK McWILLIAMS: Sure. Is that better?

MS. PRZYBYLO: Much better.

MARK McWILLIAMS: Great. Thank you. My name is Mark McWilliams, M-a-r-k M-c-W-i-l-l-i-a-m-s. I represent Disability Rights Michigan. We are the federally-mandated protection and advocacy agency advocating for people with disabilities, and as part of that work also find ourselves involved in issues involving racial equity.

Disability Rights Michigan is part of a -- part of a collaborative of organizations working with people with disabilities that has looked at cultural, developing cultural and linguistic competency, and for that reason, we support the rule on requiring implicit bias training for healthcare providers, we believe that that's a serious problem and in all aspects of the professional practice, not just in healthcare, but believe that the requirements are really important to improve services to black, indigenous, and people of color.

We have three suggestions which we will submit in writing to improve the rule. One is -- relates to the record and making sure that the community is consulted, including the people who are most affected by the rule, that the training requirement actually would be increased in terms of the number of hours, and that there be explicit reference to addressing racism and ethnicity

issues in the training standards themselves. Thank you. 1 MS. MARKS: I'm not seeing anyone else; 2 are you, Kerry? 3 4 MS. PRZYBYLO: No. 5 MS. MARKS: If there are no other persons 6 who wish to speak at this time, we'll take a ten-minute 7 recess to see if others join us that would like to make 8 comments. Thank you. 9 (At 1:10 p.m., there was a brief recess.) 10 (Brief discussion held off the record.) THE REPORTER: Are we back on the record? 11 12 MS. PRZYBYLO: Yes. Hold on just one 13 second. Lori, yes, we are going to go back on the record 14 because there is a comment, but we're waiting for 15 Mr. Blundo to unmute himself before he can speak. 16 JAMES BLUNDO: I have done that. I 17 apologize, for some reason my computer won't let me raise 18 my hand. 19 MS. MARKS: No problem. Is that -- if that is assessments 24 built in to the implicit bias training, can it be added 25 as a pre-post test? And I also wanted to second what

Mr. Blundo said, if there could be a list of approved 1 trainings. And I'm the training coordinator for the 2 3 Guidance Center in Southgate. Thank you. 4 MS. MARKS: Is there anyone else who 5 would like to make a comment at this time? If so, please hit the reaction button, or if you're on your phone, hit 6 7 *6 and speak. I'm not seeing anyone else; are you, 8 Kerry? 9 10 I'm paging through MS. PRZYBYLO: No. 11 all the attendees. I don't see any further indications 12 that someone wishes to make a comment. 13 MS. MARKS: All right. If there are no 14 further comments at this time, I hereby declare the 15 hearing closed. 16 MS. PRZYBYLO: Oh, wait. Christine 17 Farrell. MS. MARKS: Christine Farrell. 18 19 CHRISTINE FARRELL: Good afternoon. 20 Sorry. I was trying to, like some of the others. My 21 name is Christine Farrell, C-h-r-i-s-t-i-n-e, Farrell, F-22 as in Frank a-r-r-e-l-l. And my comment is also related 23 to the implicit bias. It's under the Rule 4, No. 3, 24 letter C, small i, where it says, training offered by 25 nationally-recognized or state-recognized health-related

organization. I wondered if that could be revised to broaden, instead of health-related, maybe a nonprofit organization that offers health, human services, or other kind of training. I think health-related organization is rather limiting, and I think there are a number of organizations, nonprofits, human services organizations, or others that could offer implicit bias training. I think health-related organization might be too limiting.

MS. PRZYBYLO: Thank you, Christine.

CHRISTINE FARRELL: Thank you.

MS. MARKS: Are there any other comments?

MS. PRZYBYLO: I don't see any, Dena.

Oh, Rhonda Dailey has a comment.

RHONDA DAILEY: Hi. My name is Rhonda

Dailey, that's spelled R-h-o-n-d-a, last name is D- as in

doll a-i-l-e-y. And I wanted to know what is the next

step in this process once this hearing is over and the

comments are made, how long will it be and when will the

rules take place?

MS. PRZYBYLO: Rhonda, this is the public hearing to receive comments on the rules. We're in the middle of the process, I guess you could say. We still need to review all the comments, and then once the draft is complete, it is sent over to the legislature to sit for 15 joint session days. That is kind of an

unpredictable amount of time because a joint session day is when both the House and the Senate are in session and take a vote. So that's kind of a nebulous timeframe, so I can't give you a real good estimate, but most likely, I'm guessing it will be in the fall sometime that they may finish the promulgation process. It's just a guess. Lots of other factors can impact that.

RHONDA DAILEY: Thank you for that sincere response. I do have a question. For people that may have, you know, gone to implicit bias training even now or until the time that the rule is actually set in place, will that information or the training they've received count toward the new rule?

MS. PRZYBYLO: I think, if I remember correctly, the rule indicates that you have to take it within a certain amount of time before you apply for licensure. So you would have to look -- I don't remember off the top of my head what that is, but you'd have to look at that specifically. If it doesn't have a date in there, then generally speaking, the requirement happens when the rule becomes in effect, so you would have to take it from the day of promulgation forward, if the rule doesn't say something differently.
